Sophie Bacq, Kelley School of Business,
Indiana University



Sophie Bacq is an **Associate Professor of Entrepreneurship** and an Institute for Entrepreneurship & Competitive Enterprise Faculty Fellow at the Kelley School of Business, Indiana University.

In her research, Sophie investigates and theorizes about **entrepreneurial action aiming to solve intractable social and environmental problems** at the individual, organizational, and civic levels of analysis.

She has taught and conducted empirical research on **social entrepreneurship in Europe, the United States and South Africa**, and has co-edited three books on the topic.

Sophie's research has been published in leading academic journals such as Academy of Management Discoveries, Academy of Management Perspectives, Academy of Management Review, California Management Review, Entrepreneurship & Regional Development, Entrepreneurship: Theory & Practice, Journal of Business Ethics, Journal of Business Venturing, and Journal of Management Studies. She is a field editor at the **Journal of Business Venturing**. She serves on the **Editorial Review Boards** of the Academy of Management Journal, Entrepreneurship: Theory & Practice, and Journal of Management. With Tom Lumpkin, she is the recipient of the 2020 Academy of Management Perspectives' Best Article Award titled "[Civic wealth creation: A new view of stakeholder engagement and societal impact](#)."

Sophie is the co-Director of [The Annual Social Entrepreneurship Conference](#)—one of the premiere academic gatherings on the topic—and co-Convener of the [Annual Social Entrepreneurship Doctoral Seminar](#). Prior to joining Indiana University, she was a Thomas E. Moore Faculty Fellow and Assistant Professor in Entrepreneurship and Innovation at Northeastern University, and a visiting scholar at New York University Stern School of Business. She received her doctorate in economic and management sciences from the Université Catholique de Louvain (Belgium), where she also received her master's and bachelor's degrees in business engineering.

Silvia Dorado is currently **Associate Professor of management** at the College of Management, UMass, Boston.

She is also **Associate Editor** of [Business and Society](#) and a **board member** of **DePaul Industries** (www.depaulindustries.com); a social enterprise devoted to generate employment for individuals with disabilities.

In her research, Dr. Dorado has explored topics around **processes of social innovation** within markets as well as the founding, management, and challenges of social enterprises.

She has published on these topics in some of the top journals in management including Academy of Management Journal, Business and Society, Journal of Business Venturing, Journal of Development Entrepreneurship, Nonprofit and Voluntary Sector Quarterly, and Organization Studies. Dr. Dorado received her M.A. from MIT and her Ph.D. from McGill University.

Matthew Grimes, Judge Business School,
University of Cambridge



Matthew Grimes is **Reader in Organisational Theory & Information Systems** and **Co-Director of the Entrepreneurship Centre** at Cambridge Judge Business School (University of Cambridge).

Dr Matthew Grimes's research examines how **individuals and organisations create, introduce, and sustain positive social change** by way of entrepreneurship.

To this end he studies both the contextual factors (e.g. regional and institutional differences) that enable innovation and social change as well as the individual factors (e.g. demographic and identity differences) that motivate and sustain individuals' commitment to such change.

He studies these factors primarily in **contexts such as social entrepreneurship and business incubators/accelerators**, where attempts to create, introduce, and sustain social change and innovation are particularly important and challenging.

Dr Matthew Grimes currently serves on the **editorial review boards** of Administrative Science Quarterly, Academy of Management Journal, Academy of Management Review, Journal of Business Venturing and Strategic Entrepreneurship Journal. He also previously served on the editorial review board for Entrepreneurship, Theory, & Practice.

Johanna Mair, Hertie School of Governance



Johanna Mair is a **Professor of Organization, Strategy and Leadership** at the Hertie School in Berlin.

Her research focuses on **the nexus of organizations, institutions and societal challenges**. Her focus in recent work is on mechanisms that enable organizations to transform social systems and make progress on social problems.

She is the academic editor of **Stanford Social Innovation Review** and co-directs the **Global Innovation for Impact Lab** at the Stanford Center on Philanthropy and Civil Society.

She has co-directed the **Social Innovation + Change Initiative** at the Harvard Kennedy School, has served on the faculty at IESE Business School, and has held a visiting position at the Harvard Business School and INSEAD. Her book **Innovation and Scaling – How effective Social Entrepreneurs create Impact** (Stanford University Press, 2017 co-authored with Christian Seelos) has won the 2017 Terry McAdam Award at ANOVA and the 2018 ONE Outstanding Book Award at the Academy of Management Meeting.

Her **research** has appeared in the Academy of Management Journal, Organization Studies, Academy of Management Discoveries, Academy of Management Perspectives, Journal of Business Venturing, Journal of Business Ethics, Research in Organizational Behavior, Research in the Sociology of Organizations and other journals, and has appeared in the Financial Times, Nature Human Behavior and Stanford Social Innovation Review.

Christopher Marquis, SC Johnson College of Business, Cornell University



Christopher Marquis is the Samuel C. Johnson Professor in Sustainable Global Enterprise at Cornell University. He is the author of [*Better Business: How the B Corp Movement is Remaking Capitalism*](#).

His research and writing focus on **how businesses are creating a more resilient and sustainable capitalism** by focusing on the elusive triple bottom line of environmental, social and financial performance.

Prior to joining Cornell, he worked for 10 years at Harvard Business School where he developed an award-winning course on **social entrepreneurship**.

He is the author of more than 20 peer-reviewed academic articles and more than 50 Harvard business cases on topics related to sustainable business, and has earned awards for scholarly achievement from the Academy of Management and the American Sociological Association.

Marquis earned a PhD in sociology and business administration from the University of Michigan.
